Emerging and diversifying industries

- Space Launch Site and Autonomous drone movement testing The total market size of the aerospace industry in Australia was estimated to reach over \$7B in 2022.
- Bio fermentation It is estimated the Fermented Future Foods industry could produce close to \$1.1B worth of retail products and up to 2,020 jobs nationally by 2030, and synthetic biology could underpin a thriving Australian bioeconomy worth up to \$27B by 2040.
- Protected cropping The protected cropping industry is the fastest growing food sector in Australia, with approximately 20% (\$1.2B) of the value of total vegetable production in Australia now grown under protective structures.

- Aquaculture Over \$116M per annum in production for the region, which is over 50% of the Queensland aquaculture annual production value.
- New protein production systems Farmed algae.
- Renewable energy production
 - 15 current renewables energy plants - 760MW capacity
 - 32 proposed renewable energy plants - 15,811MW capacity
- 2 under construction energy plants - 454MW capacity

Case Study: Place-based housing solutions

In October 2022, RDA Greater Whitsundays (RDA GW) and Greater Whitsunday Communities (GWC) partnered to deliver a Housing Project to identify potential solutions to the housing needs in the Greater Whitsunday region, at both a social and economic level. Supporting the delivery of the Greater Whitsundays Housing Project was the formation of a Greater Whitsundays Housing Alliance. The Alliance is a collaboration of stakeholder peak bodies from across the housing continuum.



- Roundtable event (December 2022) which attracted some 60 leading groups from the region with a direct and indirect role in housing provision across the full continuum. The Roundtable was the precursor activity to establishing the project, the Greater Whitsunday Housing Alliance and being successful with the provision of regional investment to support the project.
- Research project that delivered the Greater Whitsunday Housing Playbook.
- Housing Summit (August 2023) and an Action Plan as an outcome of the Summit.

The Greater Whitsunday Housing Project is now formalising a governance framework for the Alliance, to allow it to continue to operate, receive investment and manage projects and funding. The Alliance has commenced working with public and private parties toward housing solutions that are place-based and meet sub regional needs and priorities and that are aligned with the recommendations in the Playbook and the Action Plan from the Housing Summit. The Alliance is also engaging with Ministers and agencies at local, state and national scale and is providing feedback and views toward a range of housing enquiries, programs and funding initiatives.

Case Study: Women in Leadership Program

Stage 1 of the Women in Leadership Program delivered by RDA GW offered an integrated multi focus program of leadership development. The program offered two distinct leadership development offerings, including participants completing two full day workshops of what are effectively micro credentials. In addition, the program offered all participants access to local and regional leadership mentors, masterclasses, and industry networking opportunities. Mentors were comprised of local and regional individuals who had current or past high levels of leadership experience across business and the community. Local trainers were contracted to facilitate the workshops and masterclasses.



Stage 2 of the Women in Leadership Thriive program provided further personal and professional skill development and consisted of an additional ten months and five 2-hour workshops for the current cohort. Mentoring continued through to completion of the program. The benefits of personal and professional development have been far-reaching for the Women in Leadership Program participants - including career satisfaction and improved mental health.
