REGIONAL ROADMAP AND KEY ENABLERS

The Greater Whitsundays Regional Roadmap provides a secure and prosperous economic investment prospect.

The Roadmap recognises that economic prosperity requires planning and commitment from government and the private sector but it also demands attention to raising the liveability and wellbeing of the region's existing and future community and visitors. A principal element in the process of developing the Roadmap was recognising that liveability had to extend beyond job creation. The Roadmap is not an extensive list of priority projects. It calls for supporting programs that will address many of the principal challenges of the region, notably access to a wide range of community services, supporting and delivering affordable housing and creating training and skills pathways to retain and attract talent.

The Roadmap identifies discrete enablers that will transform and catalyse economic and community benefits. The enablers consist of projects, policies and programs across a range of sectors and timeframes, including the short-term of the next three years, the medium-term from 2025-2027, and the long-term from 2028-2032.

But the region is not without its challenges. This Roadmap has been developed to position the region smartly for future growth, in a way that will improve economic prosperity and community wellbeing over the next decade.

This Roadmap was developed through a highly collaborative process with a range of stakeholders across industry, education and governments. It focuses on building the competitive advantages of the region and elevating the range of opportunities that present themselves now and in the immediate future in the sectors of agribusiness, energy, water, aerospace and aviation.

- 10 (0.06%) employ 200+ staff

Business counts by turnover per annum

- 3,762 (24%) turnover less than \$50K
- 1,932 (13%) turnover \$50K-\$100K
- 2,577 (17%) turnover \$100K-\$200K
- 3,236 (21%) turnover \$200K-\$500K

EMPLOYMENT/UNEMPLOYMENT

Unemployment

- 2,417 (2.4%) unemployed persons in January quarter 2022, compared to state average of 5.3%
- Within the region, Whitsunday LGA had the highest unemployment rate of 3.0% and Isaac LGA had the lowest unemployment rate of 0.9%

Employment

- 97,000 (71.5%) employed persons in the region
- Employment growth over the past 12 months was 0.7%, compared to state average of 5.5%
